Re: Notice of Data Security Incident

Dear Attorney General Labrador:

The Beckage Firm represents Squire & Co (hereinafter referred to as “Squire”) in connection with a recent data security incident described in greater detail below.

1. Nature of Security Incident

In or around January 2026, Squire printed and mailed tax documents on behalf of its client. A document-to-envelope misalignment caused certain personal information to be visible through the envelope window in connection with that mailing.

After identifying the issue, Squire reviewed its mailing procedures to address the envelope alignment issue and to determine the scope of the affected mailings. Based on that review, Squire is providing this notice.

The potentially impacted information that may have been accessible included individuals’ first and last name and Social Security number.

2. Number of Idaho Residents Affected

Squire notified three (3) Idaho residents of this incident via first class mail on March 30, 2026. A sample copy of the notification letter is included with this correspondence.

3. Steps Taken Relating to this Incident

After identifying the issue, Squire reviewed its mailing procedures to address the envelope alignment issue.

Squire has established a toll-free call center through IDX, a leader in risk mitigation and response, to answer any questions about the incident and address related concerns. In addition, while Squire is not aware of the misuse of any information as a result of this incident, out of an abundance of caution, Squire is also providing complimentary identity protection services to notified individuals.

NOTICE OF DATA BREACH

We are writing to inform you of an incident involving the inadvertent disclosure of certain personal information related to a mailing sent by Squire & Co. (“Squire”). At this time, we are not aware of any misuse of your information.

What Happened?

In or around January 2026, Squire printed and mailed tax documents on behalf of its client. A document-to-envelope misalignment caused certain personal information to be visible through the envelope window in connection with that mailing.

After identifying the issue, Squire reviewed its mailing procedures to address the envelope alignment issue and to determine the scope of the affected mailings. Based on that review, Squire is providing this notice.

What Information Was Involved?

The information that was visible through the envelope window in certain mailings included your name and Social Security number.

What Are We Doing?

Squire is offering identity theft protection services through IDX, a data breach and recovery services provider. IDX identity protection services include: <<12 months / 24 months>> of credit and CyberScan monitoring, a \$1,000,000 insurance reimbursement policy, and fully managed identity theft recovery services. If your identity is compromised, IDX will assist you in resolving any related issues.

What You Can Do:

We encourage you to enroll in these complimentary identity protection services and to remain vigilant by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your credit reports for any suspicious activity.

To enroll or if you have questions, please contact IDX by calling 1-833-788-9712 or by scanning the QR code and using the enrollment code provided above. IDX representatives are available Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00

p.m. Eastern Time. The deadline to enroll is June 30, 2026.

At this time, there is no evidence that your information has been misused. However, we encourage you to take full advantage of this service offering as a precaution.

Recommended Steps to Help Protect Your Information

- 1. Website and Enrollment.** Scan the QR image or go to <https://app.idx.us/account-creation/protect> and follow the instructions for enrollment using your Enrollment Code provided at the top of the letter.
- 2. Activate the credit monitoring** provided as part of your IDX identity protection membership. The monitoring included in the membership must be activated to be effective. Note: You must have established credit and access to a computer and the internet to use this service. If you need assistance, IDX will be able to assist you.
- 3. Telephone.** Contact IDX at 1-833-788-9712 to gain additional information about this event and speak with knowledgeable representatives about the appropriate steps to take to protect your credit identity.
- 4. Review your credit reports.** We recommend that you remain vigilant by reviewing account statements and monitoring credit reports. Under federal law, you also are entitled every 12 months to one free copy of your credit report from each of the three major credit reporting companies. To obtain a free annual credit report, go to www.annualcreditreport.com or call 1-877-322-8228. You may wish to stagger your requests so that you receive a free report by one of the three credit bureaus every four months.

If you discover any suspicious items and have enrolled in IDX identity protection, notify them immediately by calling or by logging into the IDX website and filing a request for help.

If you file a request for help or report suspicious activity, you will be contacted by a member of our ID Care team who will help you determine the cause of the suspicious items. In the unlikely event that you fall victim to identity theft as a consequence of this incident, you will be assigned an ID Care Specialist who will work on your behalf to identify, stop and reverse the damage quickly.

You should also know that you have the right to file a police report if you ever experience identity fraud. Please note that in order to file a crime report or incident report with law enforcement for identity theft, you will likely need to provide some kind of proof that you have been a victim. A police report is often required to dispute fraudulent items. You can report suspected incidents of identity theft to local law enforcement or to the Attorney General.

5. Place Fraud Alerts with the three credit bureaus. If you choose to place a fraud alert, we recommend you do this after activating your credit monitoring. You can place a fraud alert at one of the three major credit bureaus by phone and also via Experian's or Equifax's website. A fraud alert tells creditors to follow certain procedures, including contacting you, before they open any new accounts or change your existing accounts. For that reason, placing a fraud alert can protect you, but also may delay you when you seek to obtain credit. The contact information for all three bureaus is as follows:

It is necessary to contact only ONE of these bureaus and use only ONE of these methods. As soon as one of the three bureaus confirms your fraud alert, the others are notified to place alerts on their records as well. You will receive confirmation letters in the mail and will then be able to order all three credit reports, free of charge, for your review. An initial fraud alert will last for one year.

Please Note: No one is allowed to place a fraud alert on your credit report except you.

6. Security Freeze. By placing a security freeze, someone who fraudulently acquires your personal identifying information will not be able to use that information to open new accounts or borrow money in your name. You will need to contact the three national credit reporting bureaus listed above to place the freeze. Keep in mind that when you place the freeze, you will not be able to borrow money, obtain instant credit, or get a new credit card until you temporarily lift or permanently remove the freeze. There is no cost to freeze or unfreeze your credit files.

7. You can obtain additional information about the steps you can take to avoid identity theft from the following agencies. The Federal Trade Commission also encourages those who discover that their information has been misused to file a complaint with them.

Federal Trade Commission and State Attorneys General Offices. If you believe you are the victim of identity theft or have reason to believe your personal information has been misused, you should immediately contact the Federal Trade Commission and/or the Attorney General's office in your home state. You may also contact these agencies for information on how to prevent or minimize the risks of identity theft.
